When we sing Christmas carols, we are filled with joy. When we share special meals together, we remember the mission moments of reaching out to people in need. Advent allows us to reclaim the Christmas season. To reclaim the hope and the beauty and the power that is in the birth of Jesus Christ. And to remember that that same faithful God who fulfilled that promise is also going to fulfill every promise He's made to you and to me.

Don't let this Christmas season pass you by without experiencing the true beauty and significance of Advent. Slow down. Seek Him. And when you seek Him, you'll find Him waiting right here for YOU. The following were approved by the members present at the Charge Conference: 2024 Budget, 2024 Pastoral Compensation, 2024 Report of the Nominations Committee, Renewal of Lay Speakers' Certifications, and the Updated Church Membership. In addition, the 2022 Fund Balance Report, also known as the Audit Report, The Report of Trustees, and the Report of Financial Statements, was received. Dave Affeldt, chair of Church Council, presented the ministry highlights of the church for the year 2023. Tom Bolton, Lay Leader, briefly shared the outcome of the Worship Survey Results related to one worship service from January 7, 2024, as approved by the Church Council. A Future with Hope!
