Happy September, First!

Welcome back to the rhythm of the school year! I pray that you had some great adventures this summer and are rested or renewed enough to step into new things.

We are starting our own year here at First—Sunday School is back for children, youth, and adults. Music rehearsals are also starting. It's good to gather back and worship and celebrate God as a whole faith community.

This first week, some of our members will be on retreat to discern how we are called to church and live out our call to share the good news of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

I reflect on the concept of transformation, and the butterfly comes to mind. The beautiful wings and the delicate patterns of a butterfly don't show until after the caterpillar morphs into a cocoon that then struggles to get out of its restraints.

Following that transformation logic, is it really the transformation of the world as we see it that we are called to do? Or is it the transformation of the people's hearts and minds to really discover the creation we are gifted by God?

God created a perfect universe for us to steward, so says our faith's story. Living creatures are gifted to us to live and care for in harmony. I understand transformation, then that comes from *metanoia*, turning back to God and God's perfect creation.

We, as God's co-creators and partners, are tasked to act on our faithfulness to discover and realize what is already present—God's love for all, God's goodness in us, God's generosity through us. My hope for that retreat is for us to use our gifts from God in our context today and the relevance of God. What comes from our time hopefully continues our discernment as a whole community as we respond to the denomination's vision of "loving boldly, serving joyfully, and leading courageously."

Will you join me in living out this vision as we transform the world as disciples?

A NOTE FROM OUR LAY LEADER: Moving Through 2025 with Discipline

Hello Brothers and Sisters.

I want to talk a little about a couple of items this month. I'll bookend with items about Christian Education.

- 1. Nancy Lanman will be teaching another class on Social Principles for 5 weeks in the Fall. These discussions about Social Issues (this year focusing on Climate Issues) help take us back to the roots of Wesleyan teaching. As Methodists, this is important for us. For me, it also takes me back to my more passionate years. We are reminded that Jesus was passionate about His teaching. I responded to Sue and Nancy's summer questions that I am sometimes overwhelmed by the issues associated with climate change. It is the greatest issue facing our world today in many ways. I am overwhelmed these days because so many people are pooh-poohing the issue. There are many people who claim that we are not responsible for the severe environmental changes affecting our Earth. But we are very responsible. Science cannot be denied. I worked a lot on environmental issues and climate concerns as a teen and young man, working hard on Earth Day formation, authoring many articles about environmental diversity and reducing the use of chemicals. In my middle years, I pushed it to the back of my attention span but continued to support environmental causes in small ways. Now, approaching my senior years, I am reminded of how important advocacy for our earth becomes. I write regularly to elected officials on climate issues, and I support many environmental groups. That keeps me going. Classes like this also keep us going, and the discussion helps us all.
- 2. Many of us are attending a retreat in September to prayerfully discern our vision of First United Methodist Church. If you aren't able to attend, but want to **offer some thoughts**, please send me a note with ideas that you want me to share. What do you see in our future? How does God call us forward?
- 3. We have been working on goals and objectives for the congregation as a whole and in our committees for the past couple of years. Some may change or get amended after the retreat, but many will stay the same or grow, no doubt. Please continue to review goals and plans in your committees. Let's not get complacent. Let's stay fired up in our work!
- 4. After Deacon Lanman's class at 9:00 am for 5 weeks following our Fall kick-off, I will be facilitating a class that I have felt called to develop for several years. I call the class *ReConfirm*. Were you one of those kids that was preoccupied with other things--like boys or girls or sports--back during your Confirmation classes in 8th grade? Did you have a teacher who didn't engage you? Was it so long ago that you forgot lots of what you learned? Are you looking to renew your vows? Ready to fire up your discipleship? Then ReConfirm is the class for you. I will lead this class for anyone interested in reviewing Confirmation material. We will start on October 19, after Social Principles Class ends, at 9:00 am Sunday mornings in the Fireside Room. If there is enough interest, there will be a second session on Tuesday nights, via Zoom, at 6:30 pm. We will pause during Advent studies and Lenten studies and meet all other weeks for about 16 weeks in all.

A "ReConfirm" class in the United Methodist Church, as it's sometimes called, is essentially a repeat of a Confirmation Class, with lots of discussion. It's designed to help individuals deepen their understanding of Christian faith and United Methodist beliefs, and to take ownership of their faith journey. We will not have a textbook, but I plan to share handouts and use many videos. In essence, a United Methodist "ReConfirm" class is about strengthening one's faith, understanding the foundations of the church's beliefs, and making a conscious commitment to following Jesus Christ within the United Methodist tradition. I invite you to join us.

5. Regular ongoing Christian education is really important. Wesley placed great emphasis on this in the early Methodist movement. If you would like to see another class, and if you might be interested in leading a course or discussion group, please let me or any members of the Adult Education Committee know what you want.

Social Principles: A Reflection by Sue Klescewski

The past few Messengers have addressed the opportunities offered for adult education: Tom Bolton's summer session on videos and discussion of the Holy Land, and the display of articles related to the Social Principles class were available for your reading enjoyment in the Gathering Room before and after service. Both of these opportunities were well-received.

Have you thought about a class? Did you "dip your toes" in and look at the articles in the Gathering Room? Did you check out Tom's videos and discussion to see what it was all about? Think about joining us in the fall for one of the offerings.

I had never taken a class before, but when I read about the Social Principles class, I thought, "I can do that." Led by Deacon Nancy Lanman, I found myself participating, sharing my thoughts about the information and questions that she asked us to think about for the week. Well, that simply snowballed into taking the Advent book discussion facilitated by Pastor Grace, continuing the Spring Social Principles class, the Lenten class, and considering the book discussions facilitated by Val Holzman.

Surprisingly, I enjoyed delving into the materials and thinking more deeply about what all that meant to me in my life and with my faith. Our faith journey can be deepened by reading, listening, and participating with others, and being open to making changes within ourselves. Do I struggle with a complete understanding of the materials as I read them? Sometimes, but it is during the discussions that I find I do have something to share and questions to ask, or I simply sit and listen and absorb what others say. Non-threatening atmosphere, friendly exchanges, purposeful discussions, and a chance to grow are how I would describe my experiences thus far.

I am excited to continue the Social Principles discussion this fall regarding our Climate in Peril. Our recent heat waves, downpour rains and flooding, drought conditions in Texas, earthquakes in Alaska, wildfires, and carbon emissions that endanger our air quality, eruptions of long-dormant volcanoes, and much more threaten the Earth that God so lovingly created and gave to us.

Won't you join us this fall to treat yourself to new learning? Group learning can deepen understanding and shared perspective, strengthen our personal faith and spiritual growth, support and encourage, and build community, belonging, and outreach.

Book Discussion Group: September's book discussion will be held on Monday, September 15th, at 1:30 pm. We will discuss The Light We Carry: Overcoming in Uncertain Times by Michelle Obama (Nurturing for Community). In this follow-up to her acclaimed memoir, former First Lady Michelle Obama shares practical wisdom and powerful strategies for staying hopeful and balanced in today's highly uncertain world. She opens a candid conversation with readers, exploring the questions many of us wrestle with: How do we build enduring and honest relationships? How can we discover strength and community inside our differences? What tools do we use to address feelings of self-doubt or helplessness? What do we do when it all starts to feel overwhelming?
