We are a Church of Caring and Love of Justice

This Old Testament verse keeps popping up in my studies lately, and so I share it here with you:

He has told you, O man (Adam), what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? ~Micah 6:8 English Standard Version~

God cares about You, and so do We. That is our Vision statement, and that is how I see this Church, our little local congregation.

I see us also as a Church that loves justice, and we keep learning to humbly live and act on it. I am so proud of the many caring ministries that our fellowship offers and supports. I have been thinking about AWANA (It was so great to be there with the kids and families this past month!) and the families we support and love and relate within the AWANA community. I think about our vibrant food pantry. What a great team! I love our Second Saturday Servants. We grow so much and are filled so full of Christ when we serve others and develop these new relationships. I am excited about the work of our Congregational Care team; if you have needs that you want to discuss with a caring person, please talk to Pastor Grace or Laura Molleson to get connected with a team member. I think about our amazing music ministry--a powerful presentation of our faith and theology. I think about all the visions we shared at our retreat in September! More on that shortly......

I am thinking about all the Christian education offerings in our Church. I hope you have found a class that suits you. Our classes are even better when you are there with us. If you are looking for something different or a different time or venue, please talk to me about what you are looking for or to Nancy Lanman or Sue Klescewski, our Chairs of Adult Christian Education. I will be starting a new class--ReConfirm--on Sunday mornings and Tuesday nights, starting October 19 at 9:00 am or October 21 alternatively, zooming at 6:30 pm. Many of our classes function like Wesleyan Bands; these are great groups for sharing and growing. We have many more ministries and groups that serve with care to our communities.

A dozen of us shared **visions at a Retreat last month**. We will be sharing our main activity visions in worship and discussing and presenting at a Church Council meeting. We concluded with five main visions to pursue. Work committees have already started working on some of these:

- --Revitalize our building for more community use. We are having a study done to help us plan this. Many of you will be involved in helping to define and develop this in the next few months.
- --Develop a music academy at First Church to serve the greater community with Church music programming and teaching. This will take advantage of our background, contacts, reputation and talented resources.
- --Strengthen our Food Pantry and maximize safety and loving care for our clients and servants.
- --Provide ongoing education and training on Christian Social Ethics, building on what we have started in recent years.
- --Engage our whole congregation in being a welcoming, inclusive community, that is a place of comfort and community for many cultural and diverse backgrounds. We will make use of training that we have received in the past, and partner with other congregations and communities and share our invitation with many others. There are many ideas raised to help with this. We will **discuss and engage** more and more as a full community of Christ.

As I noted a year ago, many of us are getting more mature, and we still have lots to share yet. Our roles as Disciples don't end; there is no mandatory retirement date for discipleship. Keep up the good work. I appreciate you all.

FUMCWA CHRISTIAN EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES

Adult Christian Education Offerings by Deacon Nancy Lanman: Last month, after our summer respite, First United Methodist Church - West Allis highlighted the energetic return of Sunday School and Christian education programs with its vibrant fall foliage at the entrance to our sanctuary! Brilliant fall colors also emphasized new learning opportunities and resources designed to deepen our faith journeys and enhance ministry participation within the community.

Many of us may not be aware that our teachers have been working to discover new ways of offering resources to our community, and that this summer we provided a foretaste of what we have learned and additional sources of materials we have discovered. Tom Bolton invited us to share an exciting journey to the Holy Land and its sacred places through a series of engaging and moving videos. Sue Klescewski and I put together and distributed a collection of current articles from respected faith-oriented journals and magazines that challenged us to exercise our moral muscles to alleviate critical social justice issues. Articles chosen related to our current study of the Climate Change Crisis that our UMC Social Principles enumerate.

The entire congregation was also invited, after worship one Sunday, to view and reflect upon an episode of the new PBS series, the Human Footprint, that dealt with the ecological costs of hydroelectric dams. These resources are being offered, not solely in the context of regular classes, but in new ways to give our people a greater opportunity to experience a wider and deeper understanding of engaged discipleship, one that helps us to become better equipped to share our gifts in ministries underway here in our neighborhood and city.

Sunday School, worship, engaging in ministry all help us "to know not what to think, but how to think," as disciples of Jesus Christ and as how he would have us do as his followers. We must become more aware of how we are his presence, gifted in the Holy Spirit's presence, to then engage in our lives as Jesus did, when he lived among us.

Book Discussion Group: On Monday, October 20, at 1:30 pm, the group will discuss *Thief of Corinth* by Tessa Afshar. After years spent living with her mother and oppressive grandfather in Athens, Ariadne runs away to her father's home in Corinth, only to discover the perilous secret that destroyed his marriage: though a Greek of high birth, Galenos is the infamous thief who has been robbing the city's corrupt of their ill -gotten gains. Desperate to keep him safe, Ariadne risks her good name, her freedom, and the love of the man she adores to become her father's apprentice. As her unusual athletic ability leads her into dangerous exploits, Ariadne discovers that she secretly revels in playing with fire. But when the wrong person discovers their secret, Ariadne and her father find their future - and very lives - hanging in the balance. When they befriend a Jewish rabbi named Paul, they realize that his radical message challenges everything they've fought to build yet offers something neither dared hope for. The group meets in the Bernice Nailen Memorial Library. All are welcome.
